VULCAN AT 120



MAGNIFYING THE MISSION OF

We celebrated Vulcan's 120th birthday as the presenting sponsor of the "Vulcan at 120" gallery exhibit at Vulcan Park & Museum. The partnership with Vulcan spans nearly a century, originating with our inaugural president, J. Mercer Barnett. Under his leadership, Kiwanis crafted a comprehensive park plan. A decade later, Kiwanians united to secure funds to relocate Vulcan to Red Mountain. In honor of our Centennial, Kiwanian invested nearly six million dollars to revitalize the back entrance, establish the Kiwanis Centennial Plaza, develop the Kiwanis Vulcan Trail, and illuminate this monument with light shows that are a lasting gift to the city. We anticipate future opportunities to strengthen our partnership to ensure that Vulcan remains an enduring source of pride and inspiration for generations to come.

MAGNIFYING OUR MISSION BY BUILDING READERS

BOOKS NOT BULLETS

Books inspire. They can also build relationships and community. The Kiwanis Club of Birmingham and Jefferson County Sheriff's Office are partnering to build a stronger, safer community and to foster a love for reading through Books Not Bullets. The program was started several years ago by Kiwanian and Sheriff Mark Pettway. Kiwanis is now the program's sponsor and will provide hundreds of books annually for Jefferson County deputies to distribute on patrol. It's an opportunity to build positive relationships between the deputies and the families they serve. It's also a chance to help children build home reading libraries and foster a love for reading.

The first 200 books were donated at the September 16, 2024 meeting. Another 100 books will be gifted in October.



KIWANIS READS

A new chapter started for our preschool reading program with the addition of six Birmingham City Schools pre-K sites. Kiwanians read and distributed books to children in 13 schools, including new sites at Avondale, Epic, Glen Iris, Norwood and Tuggle Elementary Schools.

"The boys and girls have been excited to have members of the Kiwanis Reads program read to them," said Arlene Williams of Birmingham City Schools. "Through reading aloud, vocabulary is introduced, fluency in reading is demonstrated, expressive reading occurs and most important to me the demonstration of reading for pleasure occurs. "

Kiwanis Reads was selected by the Alabama District of Kiwanis to represent Alabama at Kiwanis International. It also received recognition from Charles Hard Elementary for annual Santa visits and toy donations. The program will expand again to include more Birmingham schools and another 300 students.







AND BUILDING TOMORROW'S LEADERS YOUTH OF THE YEAR

The Club awarded \$21,000 in scholarships to nine students from Jefferson and Shelby Counties who have excelled academically and who are serving our community. Katie Smith of Hewitt-Trussville was named Overall Scholar, and Jacari Dillard of Ramsay was awarded the Legacy Scholarship in honor of late Kiwanian Harry Brock Jr., a founder of Central Bank (now PNC). Harry also founded three charitable foundations, including the Birmingham Kiwanis Foundation.

At the event, the first Legacy Award recipient, Rylen Dempsey, now a freshman on the University of Alabama Dean's List, shared with Kiwanian and fellow Youth of the Year Scholar Anoop Mishra, "The Kiwanis Club of Birmingham opened doors that were otherwise inaccessible and lowered the threshold for me to attend college through relational and financial support. With your support, I have been able to build a wonderful community, pilot innovative ideas on campus, grow in knowledge, and, in the future, leave Tuscaloosa better than I found it."

Past recipients include U.S. Senator Doug Jones, Past Kiwanis President and Bradley Partner Matt Lembke, and Diplomat Dr. Keith Anderton.

Kiwanians had a chance to hear from Sumaira Quraishi, the UAB Circle K president, during Circle K week. As has been the case for many organizations, she said membership declined post COVID. Her team was working to change that by fostering relationships through the Alabama Leadership Academy and Alabama District Convention, as well as collaborating with UAB on more university events.

ATHLETIC AWARDS

In its 91th year, the Athletic Awards honored 18 high school seniors from Jefferson and Shelby Counties and one team for their dedication to athletics. The students had the opportunity to hear from ESPN reporter and former Rutgers gymnast Lauren Sisler about overcoming adversity. Kiwanian and Olympic Gold Medalist Diver Jennifer Chandler assisted Athletic Awards Co-Chairs Jay Kasten and Tom Lamkin by handing out the awards.

THE COACH'S CHOICE AWARD

Korey Harper of Hewitt-Trussville High School was honored with the Coach's Choice Award in honor of longtime Kiwanian and Athletic Awards Chair Dr. Don Englebert. Korey was the Girls Basketball Student Assistant Coach and Director of Basketball Operations. Korey coordinated practice scheduled and managed film and statistics, as well as social media accounts. The team's coach describes him as "the backbone of the program. He demonstrates exceptional organizational skills and leadership qualities."





WILLIAM LEGG ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

This award honors a senior athlete who excelled in sports and academics while investing in our community. Simone Christian McCray of Jefferson County IB received the honor. The Girls Volleyball Team captain received the Alabama High School Volleyball Coaches Association All-State Honorable Mention while maintaining a GPA of 3.8. She completed a work study at Williams Blackstock Architects and volunteered for the Salvation Army.

FRED SINGTON AWARD

The award went to the Clay-Chalkville Football Team. The Cougars led by Coach Stuart Floyd concluded their regular season 14-0 and regionals 6-0 winning the Alabama High School Athletic Association 6A State Football Championship. The team captains accepted a newly designed championship ring trophy.







MAGNIFYING OUR MISSION BY BUILDING COMMUNITY

BIRMINGHAM KIWANIS FOUNDATION GRANTS

The Birmingham Kiwanis Foundation Grants Review Team chaired by Past Presidents Donna Smith and Ann Florie received more than \$126,000 in grant requests from local organizations serving children. Twelve organizations received a total of \$55,000 to help continue our Club's legacy of serving our community's children. The funds were distributed in July to:

- The Bell Center to purchase an external stander, a therapy tool to assist children who cannot stand or are delayed in their ability to stand
- Better Basics to fund books for 379 Jefferson County children through the Dolly Parton Imagination Library
- College Choice Foundation to provide staff support for student essay training and individual essay planning
- Down Syndrome of Alabama to support the pilot of a new tutoring program called EDGE UP
- Levite Jewish Community Center (LJCC) to provide the opportunity for 10 children with physical and/or developmental disabilities to attend summer camp
- The Lovelady Center to provide afterschool and enrichment activities for children living at the center
- Mothers' Milk Bank of Alabama to support at least 20 medically fragile infants
- The Morgan Project to allow at least 35 high school students and 15 chaperones to participate in the Conflict and Courage bus tour
- Oasis Counseling to provide mental health care for 71 adolescent girls
- Preschool Partners to pay for LAP Birth to Kindergarten curriculum
- Smile-A-Mile to cover programming for four children diagnosed with cancer this year and their families
- STAIR (Start the Adventure in Reading) to cover 500 books for second graders participating in the program

Annually, grant applications open in late spring with recipients notified by June.



OUR IMPACT ON THE LIVES OF FAMILIES

The impact and reach of the \$35,000 in 2023 Foundation grants in 2023 seven local nonprofits serving children exceeded initial goals. More homeless families were provided shelter. There was a 39% increase in the Jones Valley Teaching Farm Food Delivery Program to Birmingham students. Additional volunteers were trained to help children with serious illnesses. 
